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# **History 113H: Honors American Military History**

#### **Introduction and Purpose:**

Welcome to Honors American Military History. The purpose of the honors section for this class is to investigate themes and processes of American Military History on a more analytical and comparative level than the regular course. Examining some of the historical scholarship for American Military History will allow you to explore and investigate important themes of military history and refine research and critical thinking skills. Though there will be more work expected of you, I hope you will find our honors experience to be stimulating, fun and challenging. In addition to the regular course learning outcomes, as we embark on our adventure in learning I am hoping that will accomplish the following goals:

- 1. Gain an enriched knowledge of American Military History
- 2. Learn how to find and use library primary and second source collections pertaining to military history.
- 3. Acquire an interest in learning more by asking questions and seeking answers. Successful honors students are self-disciplined, are self-directed, and take individual responsibility for their learning.
- 4. Develop skills in expressing oneself orally and in writing.
- 5. Learn how to analyze and critically evaluate ideas, arguments and points of view.
- 6. Work with peers to develop techniques and skills used by professional historians.

**Please Note:** Honors Contracts are irreversible once they are signed by the student.

### **Required Texts: In addition to the Regular Course materials:**

• I will periodically assign source documents from Brad Lookingbill's *American Military History* and John Chambers' *Major Problems in American Military History* to discuss in meetings inperson and on blackboard. Students will not need to purchase these two books.
