Step One: Preview: Read only the title of the piece, and look to see if there are any graphics, charts, pictures or section headings (look for things in bold or italics) briefly describe what you noticed when you previewed?

Group 5: the first two paragraphs are an introduction to what she'll be writing about. The last two paragraphs sum up how social classes are relevant when it comes to who benefits from certain teaching styles.

Step Four: Predict: Now that you read the beginning and the end of this piece, write another sentence or two about what this article is about--expand your original prediction in step 2 or change it.

GROUP MIKE:

We will stick to our original prediction, but we will add on to it.

<u>Oscars:</u> the different economical social classes can somewhat define how the students are going to be taught and how they are going to behave as w<u>ell</u>

Awesome Group1: This article is about how classes in different school districts and neighborhoods are taught to what the administrators believe the class of student should be able to become. The lower the income level (equating to class), the more emphasis there are on trades and the higher the income level (therefore higher class) the more emphasis there is on preparing students to be doctors and lawyers (post graduate work).
